The summer program has started in earnest and several times a week the ranch fills with children's voices as they go about their chores, meet and greet the horses, and saddle up or simply walk the fields and let horses graze

on the sweet purple flowers they love. (I am often tempted to water those flowers just to keep them coming back so each horse has the opportunity to get their fill.) We have had several families

who have decided they want to come out to volunteer for an afternoon here which is a huge blessing—helping us with things like feeding, cleaning troughs, mucking out pastures, and even helping with projects like putting up the next run-in shed structure. We also have a volunteer that comes up once a week to help with our sessions. Rebekah is great with the kids and is a huge help with preparing activities, learning our feeding schedule, measuring out the grains and mastering driving the Kubota!

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ZAC TAILS: Life on the ranch here can get pretty busy. There's horses to keep track of,

Usually it's several errands. It's like my people save up a bunch of errands and then do them all at once, go figure. But there

are other times when I am given a treat and told to stay home. The man usually says, "Stay here Zac, we'll be back soon." The first time this happened, I was out of my head with worry. How long is soon? What if he doesn't come back. It's taking too long. Something has happened. I'm going to die a lonely death in this house with cats laughing at me. I'm telling you it was almost too much! But soon I heard the familiar sound of the truck driving back to the house and all my worries seemed to fade away. The second time I had to stay home alone, I went through the same thing, but again, he came back and all was well. After several more times of "Stay here Zac, we'll be back soon," I began to trust that he was coming back and I didn't worry so much. I found other things to do, like chase those pesky cats. 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FINANCIAL UPDATE: Believe it or not it was "farrier time" again this month. Hoof trimming is an important maintenance program we have our horses on. Even though we do not shoe them, it's important to keep their hooves trimmed and filed for proper gait and back maintenance. If you would like to sponsor one horse for hoof trimming it would be \$30 every 8-10 weeks. The arena was completed last month, but another \$600 is needed to completely defer the expense. Also, we have started our final project of the summer which is a new run-in shed for a pasture which entails building a frame and attaching plywood. This month we purchased the final ton of hay we need to get us through the next 12 months--one ton of hay is \$225. If you would like to help, even \$10 or \$20 will make a big difference!
